

Huntsville Cave Rescue Unit Hauls & Lowers for the Wilderness Environment

May 5-6, 2018

Prerequisites for this class:

(one of the following) HCRU Single Rope Technique OR Alabama Fire College Rope I

Designed to familiarize students in the building and operation of haul and lower systems in wilderness environments. Class and hands-on field instruction will emphasize: choosing natural anchors, rigging and system operation, problem solving, and addressing system problems.

This class can be taught in your area with prior coordination. Group discounts available for Rescue Squads/Fire Departments.

May 5-6, 2018 Limited to 30 participants

Equipment Requirements

Participants must provide the following personal gear:

- *Sturdy lugged-sole lace-up boots (no sneakers or sandals)
- *Gloves (with leather palms & full-fingers)
- *Day Pack or similar for personal gear
- *Appropriate clothing (no turnout gear)
- *Kneepads soft capped are more stable on rock (hard shell tends to slide a lot)
- *Small Personal First Aid kit recommended we will be outside!
- *Bring cash for lunch on Saturday (not all places nearby accept plastic!)
 *Bring water, snacks & a lunch on Sunday

The following is strongly recommended, to allow the student

the maximum participation (The HCRU can provide these items, however, this class assumes proficiency with climbing and ascending systems. All personal climbing systems must maintain two life safety points of contact at all times - for example, ropewalkers must utilize a knee tether and an upper ascender.)

- *UIAA-Approved helmet, with chinstrap (no fire helmets)
- *Three sources of light, with main source being mounted on helmet
- *Full Seat Harness, Ascending System (Frog, Texas, Ropewalker, or Mitchell), and Descender (Rappel Rack preferred)
- *Three extra locking carabiners
- *Twenty feet of 1" tubular webbing

Age Requirement:

All participants must be 18 years old or have a signed Liability Release Form

Largest Flooded Cave System in the World Discovered at Tulum

Tulum, Q.R. — An exploration group has connected two of the largest flooded cave systems in the world in Tulum.

The exploration group Gran Acuifero Maya (GAM) have connected two of the largest flooded cave systems in the world, Sac Actun and Dos Ojos in Tulum

The caves of Sac Actun and Dos Ojos have a tunnel that connects them, a discovery that makes up the largest flooded cave in the world. According to the world rules of speleology, the largest cave absorbs the small, so Dos Ojos becomes part of Sac Actun

GAM released a statement detailing the extent of the 347-kilometer flooded cave, which displaces the largest on the planet to another underground point in Tulum, in this case Ox Bel Ha of 270 kilometers.

GAM exploration group also recorded a system with a length of 18 km so far called "The mother of all the cenotes" north of Sac Actun whose maximum depth is 20 meters.

The importance of the finding is that it gives rise to, and supports, a great biodiversity and represents a large reserve of fresh water, which has given life to this region of the Yucatan Peninsula.

GAM is a project directed by Guillermo de Anda, underwater archaeologist and explorer of National Geographic.

The project is an initiative developed with the support of Aspen Institute

Mexico, the National Institute of Anthropology and History (INAH), the Technological University of the Riviera Maya (UTRM), National Geographic and the Development Bank of Latin America (CAF).

College Student Spent 60 Hours in Cave Before Rescue, Licked Walls for Water

A 19-year-old Indiana college student contemplated foraging for crickets and licked damp walls for water after getting locked inside a gated cave for nearly 60 hours.

Indiana University freshman Lukas Cavar didn't end up eating the small insects but did use two energy bar wrappers to collect moisture and empty water bottles to collect rainfall and puddled cave water.

The Bloomington man, whose parents are Indiana University linguistics professors, was on a spelunking trip to Sullivan Cave when he became separated Sunday afternoon from 12 other members of the university's Caving club.

He said when he reached the cave's entrance, he found that club members had padlocked the gate, unaware he was still inside. With no cellphone signal, Cavar could only scream for help in hopes of motorists at a nearby road might hear him.

Cavar tried to pick the lock with a paper clip. When that didn't work, he had to figure out how he was going to survive with barely any supplies.

"It took me a little while to wrangle my emotions and sort of approach things analytically, sensibly, to come up with a game plan to survive," Cavar said Thursday, two days after he was rescued.

His parents filed a missing person report with university police when he didn't arrive back to campus with the club. A high school friend later informed the Caving Club's president Cavar was missing.

Two club leaders immediately returned to the cave late Tuesday after finding a pile of clothing in a vehicle club members used to travel to the cave two days earlier. They found Cavar uninjured and asleep behind the locked gate.

"I'm really glad to be alive. It feels like I've been given a second chance," said Cavar, who returned to classes Thursday and has no plans for another spelunking trip.

A message posted by the Caving Club's president on a website for Indiana University student organizations says the club's "rigorous protocols" for accounting for members during cave excursions had failed.

"We had a failure in our leadership to closely follow all these safety procedures," the message states, according to Indiana Daily Student. "The risk that our member was exposed to as a result of these failures is a vivid reminder of why we have protocols."

In a Facebook post on Tuesday, Cavas assured his friends and family he was safe.

"Just wanted to let everyone know that I'm safe and sound!" he wrote. "Just got rescued about 30 minutes ago. Boy, it's good to be back on the surface!"

The Safety officer is AWOL...go figure, it's what that office does to a caver.


