With another year's successful Cave-In behind us, the DCG plans to continue our grant program and once again make much of the proceeds available to help fund research and conservation projects, expeditions, conservancies, etc. Though we cannot promise to fulfill all requests, we are soliciting grant proposals from any non-profit caving group, organization or individual, all of which will be given careful consideration.

The deadline for submissions to be received in writing for this year will be Tuesday, December 11th, 2018. If at all possible, please send your request in electronic format (like a Microsoft Word document or PDF file), as that makes it much easier for us to distribute and work with. We don't need you to write a book -- a one or two page proposal is fine.

All we ask in return is that each grant recipient give something back to the Dogwood City Grotto. This would preferably be in the form of an article for our Georgia Underground publication, but could also be a slide show, demonstration, field trip, expedition report, etc.

The older DCG website page with all the details is not available at this very moment, but look for it soon. Feel free to contact me, andyzellner@gmail.com, with any questions in the meantime. Any funding will be voted on and disseminated in late December 2018.

And please pass this along to anyone/group/place you think might be interested. You should get a

SCCi Science Awards Announcement

The Southeastern Cave Conservancy, Inc. (SCCi), the largest land conservancy in the world solely focused on protecting wild caves, recently announced the award of two grants through its annual Science Award Program. Scientific research is an integral part of SCCi's work. It is essential to conserving cave and karst resources.

"Buying caves to preserve and protect them is a noble endeavor. It is what SCCi is known for." Says Dr. George Veni, Executive Director of the National Cave and Karst Research Institute and President, International Union of Speleology. "But effective preservation and protection is often impossible without good scientific research to identify needs and best management practices. SCCi's Science Awards Program helps assure their caves are sustainably managed, and supports both established and young scientists' focus on much needed cave and karst research."

This year's science award recipients

are:

(1) Drs. Cathy Borer and Angela Poole, of the Department of Biology, Berry College in Rome, Georgia for "Molecular identification of plant roots" to be conducted at Howard's Waterfall Cave Preserve, Georgia. The researchers will develop and test molecular techniques needed to identify plant species of roots that are exposed in cave walls and ceilings. The researchers note that root physiological studies done at the land surface are difficult to conduct without damaging roots their physiological influencing processes while exposing them for study. However, roots exposed in caves allow for easy access to plant roots for study and most importantly they can be sampled with minimal damage to the root system for analyses. In order to properly study root physiology, the plant species must be identified first. Thus, this study will develop and test molecular techniques to identify the plant species from root samples. The SCCi has awarded \$1,500 to support this important research.

(2) Joe Lamb and Dr. Yong Wang, of the Department of Biological and Environmental Sciences, Alabama A&M University in Huntsville, Alabama, for "Abiotic factors influencing cave use by salamanders in northern Alabama." This study forms part of Joe Lamb's M.S. thesis. The researchers note that cave salamanders have strict environmental tolerances (temperature, humidity), and that their abundance and diversity are an indicator of the health of a cave and perhaps environment ecosystem health of forest systems surrounding caves. Joe and Dr. Wang will determine salamander abundance, density, and diversity in the near-surface parts of Tumbling Rock Cave Preserve in Alabama. The SCCi has awarded \$1,500

Greetings Smoke Rise! I am Wes Sims & I wanted to share with everyone some important happenings here in Smoke Rise. I own Bryant Mountain Cave & the flat stream passage lot off of White Oak Trail at the bottom of the mountain. I had no idea when I purchased what I would do other than help preserve an awesome destination for my children and others. Now I have found my calling and am excited to share that Bryant Mountain Cave is going to get some new life.

We are now hosting wild cave tours and you will see the new "Sims Cave Park" begin to develop. We definitely want to be an active and positive part of this wonderful community and welcome you to voice your recommendations and concerns.

Our plans are to build out a natural park area with some picnic tables and a covered pavilion or two. There's a lot of history with the old train depot on site as well that we want to remember and develop. A possible dog park area has been discussed also. We will be energizing the cave soon and monitored security will be in place. This will not be a place for undesirables. Inside the cave we will be restoring the large rimstone pools (Possibly largest in the country) and removing the awful graffiti from the walls.

We plan to have a "Smoke Rise Day' a couple of times a year when the cave will be open for residents. I welcome your input and also your stories and knowledge of the area. If anyone has photos or info on any old history of the area please share. We want to share the past of Smoke Rise as well as what's underneath!

What days are you open?

Our tours are made by reservation only. Go to Reservations tab or you may also call and make reservations directly over the phone (205) 876 -4020.

Are there any restrictions on tour participants?

Yes. Participants need to be in good shape and have the ability to climb and crawl through tight places. Tours are not recommended for visitors with known heart or respiratory problems, poor circulation or difficulty walking long distances or on unlevel surfaces.

Who can take the tour?

Our tours are open for everyone who is physically able. We recommend ages 12 and up although younger have participated. Everyone must sign a waiver and youth under 16 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

How much does the tour cost?

Spelunking Tour (2 Hours): \$60 Wild Cave Adventure Tour (3 Hours): \$75

Extreme Caveman Challenge (3-4 Hours): \$99

Cave tour reservations are non-refundable. Under some circumstances dates and times may be changed with a two weeks notice

How many people are in each tour?

Tours are offered in groups of 6 -12 people. Please call about any special arrangements for smaller or larger groups.

What equipment or gear do I need to bring?

Participants do not need to bring anything with them in order to go on the tour. Helmets and headlamps are provided as well as knee and elbow pads. If you want gloves you may wear them. You may bring your own gear provided that it has been thoroughly cleaned prior to arriving. Through tours will be getting wet so prepare in advance. You may bring a snack if you'd like and water is provided.

What do I need to wear?

Long sleeve pants and closed toe shoes are required on the tours. Some of the tours will require you to be partially submerged in water to exit the cave so dress appropriately. You WILL be getting dirty! It is highly recommended that you bring a change of clothes, a towel, and a bag for dirty clothes if you go on one of the through tours. You'll appreciate having some dry clothes to put on

when you exit.

What can I expect on the tour?

You can expect to see the beautiful world down under first hand. There will be passages you have to squeeze through, crawl through, and slosh through in order to get back out of the cave. You'll have an experience you are unlikely to find anywhere else!

Do I need to sign a waiver?

Yes. You will be required to sign a waiver.

Black Friday Trip

It is a tradition with the Grotto to do a black Friday trip. This year's trip was to Byers Cave in Georgia. Only Kuenn had done the cave before. Chuck had been in only a short distance. So, this was a new cave for the remaining 12 of us on the trip.



I did not know what to expect. I had heard conflicting reports about the cave. I had heard it was easy, and heard it was difficult. And all horizontal. But Kuenn had instructed us to bring a seat harness and a safety. He said there is a spot that is steep.

After parking at the SCCI designated area, we were on our way to the cave. It was a long hike, over an hour, but not too difficult. When you arrive at the entrance, there is a bluff that you have to make your way down before entering the cave.

Not far in, we started losing cavers. "I am not into it today, think I will wait here", I was told. One down. The cave starts out narrow and crawly, then quickly turns to canyon passage. In places ropes are needed to traverse deep spots. And

downward steep slopes required a safety and rappelling device. Several more cavers done.



After all the downclimbs there was an area of awkward crawling. Tight and restrictive. More cavers done. This dropped into large passage with many nice formations. The floor was slick and unlevel with lots of breakdown. But the passages got bigger and bigger as we went. We passed by several pits that could have been rigged and dropped if the gear was available. We had dropped off the gear at our last known drop. So we made our way around the pits and continued the trip.



At the turn around point we had cut the participants down to only 7. The rest were strung out through the cave

awaiting our return.

After viewing this area, we decided to head back. The downclimbs were a challenge to some, trying to get back up with only safeties. Myself included. Sometimes it doesn't pay to be short. The taller people seemed to do better in these areas of the cave.



One by one we collected our stationed cavers on the way back out. We arrived back at the entrance just as dark fell. So we got to hike the hour plus back to the car in the dark, and misting rain.

The trip was a good one for me. I had not been caving in quite awhile. A bit challenging in areas, just enough to make it interesting. And, as always, the trip was finished off with a good Mexican meal. Another good black Friday trip in the books. I will feel this one for awhile.
